Colleagues who teach young learners frequently experience classroom situations that make them realise that they are not just teachers of a foreign language, but also educators, and that they therefore need to help children to understand and take on board important social values. However, trying to do this can be a big challenge and lead to resistance rather than insight. In this session we will look at what values are and why they are important to convey to our students. We will explore various models of how to respectfully influence students' values and help them to understand the importance of value-based behaviour. Examples will include teacher congruency, the power of stories and metaphors, and interventions that students will not see as preachy or alienating, but which will help them to grow up responsibly and make wise and safe decisions for themselves.
